

First book banned in the United States:



- Quincy, Massachusetts!
- The New Canaan by Thomas Morton
- Banned in 1637
- Contained harsh critique of Puritan customs and power structures

2022: Unprecedented censorship attempts



demands to censor library books and resources, according the ALA


Almost twice 2021




states introduced book-banning bills




Where do challenges take place?

Massachusetts 2022

- 45 attempts to restrict access to books in MA
- 57 book titles challenged in MA

Rights and Legal Issues

• Equality based on race, national origin, sex, gender identity and sexual orientation

• Free speech rights, including the right to receive information

• Diversity in Education as a Bedrock of Democracy



Ludlow, Mass.

- Proposed policy any new or replacement library materials are subject to prior review and approval by the Superintendent and, after public input, the School Committee.
- Extremely vague, overbroad, and repressive standards for allowable materials
- Banned materials with "sexualized content" undefined
- School district employees who do not follow the policy could be terminated.
- Copycat of a Pennsylvania county policy




These images could have been banned under the proposed Ludlow policy.










Ludlow community members spoke out and the Ludlow School Committe declined to adopt the proposed policy.


SD. 2673 An Act regarding free expression
